Advanced registration is strongly encouraged. If you pre-register, your entry tags will be ready when you bring in your exhibits and you will avoid long lines. If you change your mind after pre-registration and do not intend to show an item, let us know when you arrive, and we will remove it from our records.

3 Bring Exhibits to the Fair at the specified times listed below:

- **Bring all NON-PERISHABLE items to the Creative Arts Building #8 on the Scott County Fairgrounds on THURSDAY, July 17 from 6-8 pm or SATURDAY, July 19 from 11 am – 2 pm.** This includes children's exhibits, needlecraft, sewing, crafts, pictures and wall hangings, artwork, and photography.
 - **Bring all PERISHABLE items to the Creative Arts Building # 8 on the Scott County Fairgrounds on TUESDAY, July 22 from 1-5 pm.** This includes baking, candy, canning, garden vegetables, herbs, fruit, flowers, beer, wine and miscellaneous.
- 4 Pick up projects/checks: All exhibits must remain in place until 6:00 PM Sunday, July 27 and be removed by 7:00 PM Sunday, July 27.** The building will be closed at 5:30 pm on Sunday night and will reopen at 6:00 pm for release. **Premium checks will be available when entries are released. Premium checks have a 30 day validation period.** All leftover exhibits will be brought to the Fair Office. **Fair Board Directors and Staff will take every precaution for the preservation of articles but will not be responsible for loss or damage beyond our control.**

Note: If you would like to donate your premium check to the fair, you can request a receipt for tax purposes

When there is one entry of a kind, the judge is not to award a premium unless one is deserved. Any premium may be withheld at the discretion of the judge. Premiums shall not be awarded to articles that are unworthy. Judges may award a maximum of 1 blue, 1 red, and 1 white in each lot. Grand and Reserve Awards are given at the discretion of the judge. All items must correspond in number and kind with the premium list in order to obtain a premium. **"Any Other or Not Specified" lots are intended only for articles that have no regular lot listed.**

Exhibitors are responsible for correct labeling of their exhibits. No premiums shall be paid to any article that has previously received a premium at the Scott County Fair. Exhibitors may exhibit in one or more lots in the same class, with **only one entry per lot except where noted.**

Mission Statement

To encourage and support the creative and artistic abilities of children in whatever medium they choose to work. To provide children with an opportunity to display their work and the work of their peers. To help foster a lifelong interest and enjoyment of art and the many opportunities art can provide.

Exhibits will be judged on the following:

- Originality
- Expression
- Design
- Neatness, display condition
- Quality of Work

Pre-K and Kindergarten entries will only receive a participation ribbon.

A superintendent has the authority to reject any entry not displayed as directed in the premium book.

Requirements for Children's exhibits:

- 1 Exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor during the past 12 months. No portion of a previous year's entry will be accepted.
- 2 Entries may consist of classroom work or at home projects.
- 3 Entries submitted from group projects, where each work has a similar appearance in design, media, and presentation, will be exhibited but not judged.
- 4 No coloring book pages will be accepted.
- 5 No step-by-step building sets, kits, or items from a mold – All entries must be from your own imagination.
- 6 Only one entry per lot. Use the grade completed this past spring.
- 7 Exhibits must be labeled on the back or underneath exhibit with the exhibitor's name and grade level completed.
- 8 Dioramas or Constructions must not exceed 20 inches x 20 inches. They must be able to stand on their own mounted on a sturdy platform or encased in a box
- 9 Legos, K'Nex, or Erector, type projects of multiple items must be mounted on a firm surface that is not to exceed 20 inches x 20 inches. Single items can stand on their own. Projects must be original creations (no kits)
- 10 JEWELRY AND BEADWORK
Beads, charms, wood, glass, or any combination. Items must be mounted on a sturdy backing such as matte board or stiff cardboard and placed in Ziploc bags.
- 11 HANGING EXHIBITS are hung from pegs on a pegboard and therefore, must have a sturdy backing. Inexpensive frames with a wire attached to the back are recommended. Any frames with a sawtooth hanger must have a wire loop attached to the sawtooth to be hung on a peg on a pegboard. Due to wind, humidity and gravity, any kind of tape and spray adhesive are highly discouraged. Exhibits that become insecure during the days of the Fair may be damaged and the fair workers may set it aside for safe keeping. The Fair and fair workers are not liable for any damage.
- 12 NON-HANGING ARTWORK will be displayed on cork board with push pins unless it is securely mounted on a sturdy and stable base, such as matte board, stiff/heavy cardboard or thin sheets of wood. Tag board and foam core are not acceptable bases. Due to wind, humidity and gravity, any kind of tape and spray adhesive is highly discouraged. Exhibits that become insecure during the days of the Fair may be damaged and the fair workers may set it aside for safe keeping. The Fair and fair workers are not liable for any damage.

Children may also enter exhibits in the open adult classes if they choose. See additional Youth Categories at the end of the Children's Exhibits.

FOOD PRESERVATION (CANNING) – One Jar (sizes listed below)

READ CAREFULLY:

For safety reasons, methods from the information below must be strictly adhered to. Please review the method, headspace, and other details of good canning methods.

Clear standard pint canning jars required, except for jams and jellies (4–8 ounce jars for jams, jellies, relish, and salsa).

Two Piece lids are required (no wax).

Leave the ring on the jar. Canning method must be stated on the label. Must be canned after last year's fair. All low acid foods must be processed in a pressure canner or boiling water bath. Fruits, tomatoes, must be processed in a boiling water bath. All canned goods must indicate the content, date, method, and processing time. Jars will be opened.

Department 11: GARDENING VEGETABLE EXHIBITS:

BEANS, SNAP: Harvest before constrictions appear between seeds, when seeds are about half grown. Ends of pods should not be broken off in picking, Pods should be uniform. Pods may be wiped clean, but not washed. Trim stems to a uniform ¼ to ½ inch in length.

BEETS, CARROTS: Root crops should be mature but not overgrown, pithy or coarse in texture. Tops trimmed off ½ inch above the crown. Side roots trimmed off but not the taproot. Roots are carefully washed, but not scrubbed.

BRUSSEL SPROUTS: Firm, bright green sprouts, all uniform size & shape.

CABBAGE: Stems cut about ¼ inch below head. Remove blemished or broken leaves, but care should be taken not to peel the heads too much. A few outside wrapper leaves are desirable. Specimens may be washed.

SWEET CORN: Select ears that are well filled out to the tip. Kernels should be milky and juicy. Remove outer husks but allow a short shank and the inner husks to remain.

CUCUMBERS, PICKLING: Select fruits 2-4 inches long. Specimens should be the same stage of maturity and uniform in size, shape and color.

CUCUMBERS, SLICERS: Select fruits that are straight, dark green, and 5-10 inches long. They should be uniform in size, shape, and color.

KOHLRABI: Roots removed just below the ball. Remove all but the upper 4-6 leaves. Select specimens that are uniform, medium size, and not hard or woody. Skin should be easily punctured by a thumbnail. They should be cleaned, but not washed.

GARLIC, ONIONS: Have specimens mature and thoroughly cured. The neck should be small. Do not peel to give a slick appearance. Only such outer scales that are broken or discolored should be removed. Small basal roots should be left intact but trimmed to a uniform length of ½ inch. Wipe or brush but do not wash.

PEAS: Harvest when bright green in color with pods that snap and do not bend with crisp flesh. Ends of pods should not be broken off in picking. Pods may be wiped clean, but not washed. Trim stems to a uniform ¼ to ½ inch in length.

PEPPERS: Select firm shiny peppers with no signs of dehydration. Trim the stem to ½ inch. They should be uniform in size and shape.

SQUASH, SUMMER: Select small to medium sized fruits when the rind is soft and easily punctured with the thumbnail. Leave about ½ inch of stem and wipe fruits clean.

SQUASH, WINTER, PUMPKINS: Select mature specimens where the rind resists pressure of the thumbnail. Fruits should be free of defects. Leave the stem attached to the fruit.

TOMATOES: Select fruits that are uniform in size, shape, and color. Fruits should be perfectly shaped and free of cracks and blemishes. Trim stems to ½ inch.

A bloom or blossom means an individual flower, one on a stem. A cluster means several blooms growing close together on the main stem. A spike means a flower structure with a stemless flower on a common lengthened stalk, as gladioli or snapdragon. A stalk is a stem with one or more blooms or buds. You may replace flowers during the fair. **Vases MUST BE weighted with clear or colored marbles to avoid tipping and should fit the size of the bloom.**

First place winners in each lot will compete for Champion. Beer may be made from malt, hops, grain, fruit/vegetable/juice or any other product commonly used in making beer. Each entry must be bottled in a clean brown or green bottle with at least a 10-ounce capacity. We prefer they have no raised glass brand name lettering and printed caps are blacked out.

Judging Criteria:

- 1 Appropriateness of classification. Does the entry belong in the lot and style the exhibitor has chosen to place it?

- 4 FLAVOR: A maximum of 19 points will be awarded: Malt (3), Hops (3), Conditioning (2), Aftertaste (3), Balance (4), Other flavor characteristics (4).
- 5 BODY (FULL OR THIN): A maximum score of 5 points will be awarded.
- 6 DRINKABILITY & OVERALL IMPRESSION: A maximum of 10 points will be awarded.
- 7 Judges will select the prize entry in each lot, reserving the right to withhold any award, if in their opinion the work submitted does not merit an award. The judge's decisions are final.
